

You'll see familiar places and obscure, vistas and closeups — plus a few of his "secret" places that will only be shown here! No 8000-meter peaks or 5.14 climbing, just special moments of light and line and form that we all have experienced on hikes, climbs, backpack trips, and car trips. The clubroom is in the Table Mesa shopping center, just upstairs from the Movie Gallery, or around the corner and through the tunnel from Neptune's.

Conservation Projects Making Every Dollar Count

Your Boulder CMC Council has voted to spend your conservation donations to fund three really great projects this year. As you may remember, five dollars of your Boulder dues goes to fund conservation grants. We are the only group in CMC to allocate this funding.

We are giving \$435 to the Indian Peaks Forest Watch, a small Nederland based volunteer group whose primary focus in fire prevention and user education in the Arapaho-Roosevelt National Forest. They take small amounts of money and large volunteer dedication and use it to produce and distribute informational pamphlets on fire safety and low-impact camping practices. They will also be distributing trash bags and trash disposal permits to promote proper campsite cleanup.

The Colorado Fourteeners Initiative is receiving \$2100 which will be leveraged into almost \$10,000 in matching grants and in-kind contributions for major restoration work on Pyramid Peak. CMC members are encouraged to contribute directly by working on this and other projects with CFI by calling their Volunteer Manager at 303-278-7525.

Our last, but most consistent conservation partner, is Wildlands Restoration Volunteers. We are granting them \$2500 in cash, as well as in-kind contributions of the Brainard cabin for one project and our newsletter space for project advertising. We are funding \$1000 for training

and community development and \$1500 for trail work on the Arapaho Lakes trail in the James Peak Wilderness. They hope to leverage this grant threefold with matching grants. CMC President Resigns

On April 6, 2006, CMC President Lon Carpenter resigned from the state board of the CMC. He stated the cause was personal reasons based on need to devote more time to his family and job. According to Kristy Judd, the executive director, Janice Heidel, the Vice President, will take over the role of president for the remainder of the calendar year. She has been the chair of the Denver Group and director of Wilderness Trekking School. David Hite, currently serving as the chair of the CMC Press Advisory Board Committee and a past chair of the Denver Group, was to be presented by the Nominating Committee to take over the role of secretary at the state board meeting on April 15. It was expected that the two empty director positions, for Treasurer and Secretary, would be filled at that meeting. Per the constitition and bylaws, the board elects officers and appoints directors to fill vacancies until the State Council meets again which will be September 30th. Peter Gowan is the Boulder Council's liason to the state board and will give his report of the state meeting at the next BCMC council meeting.

I will be helping Tom coordinate the organization of volunteers with a big To Do list on the forum, and soon we should be able to 'go live' and make the site the official one for cmcboulder.org.
